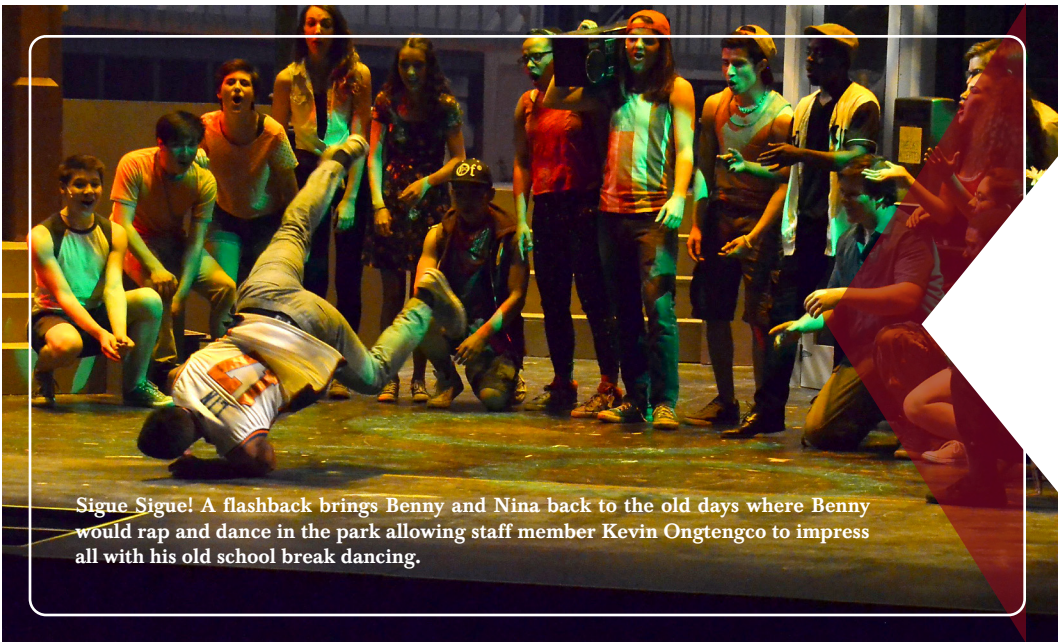

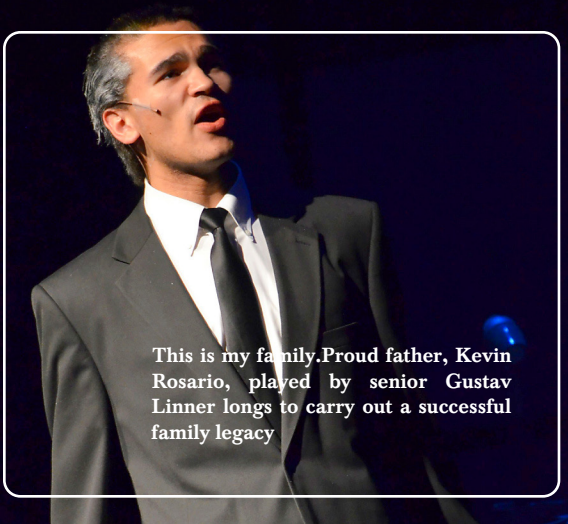
"I feel like we stepped it up this year because

Lights Up! Up at the break of day, Usnavi DelVega, portrayed by senior L'ron Suggs-Stewart, sets the scene in Washington Heights.



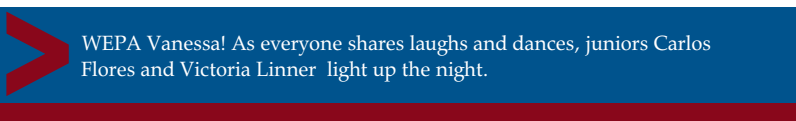

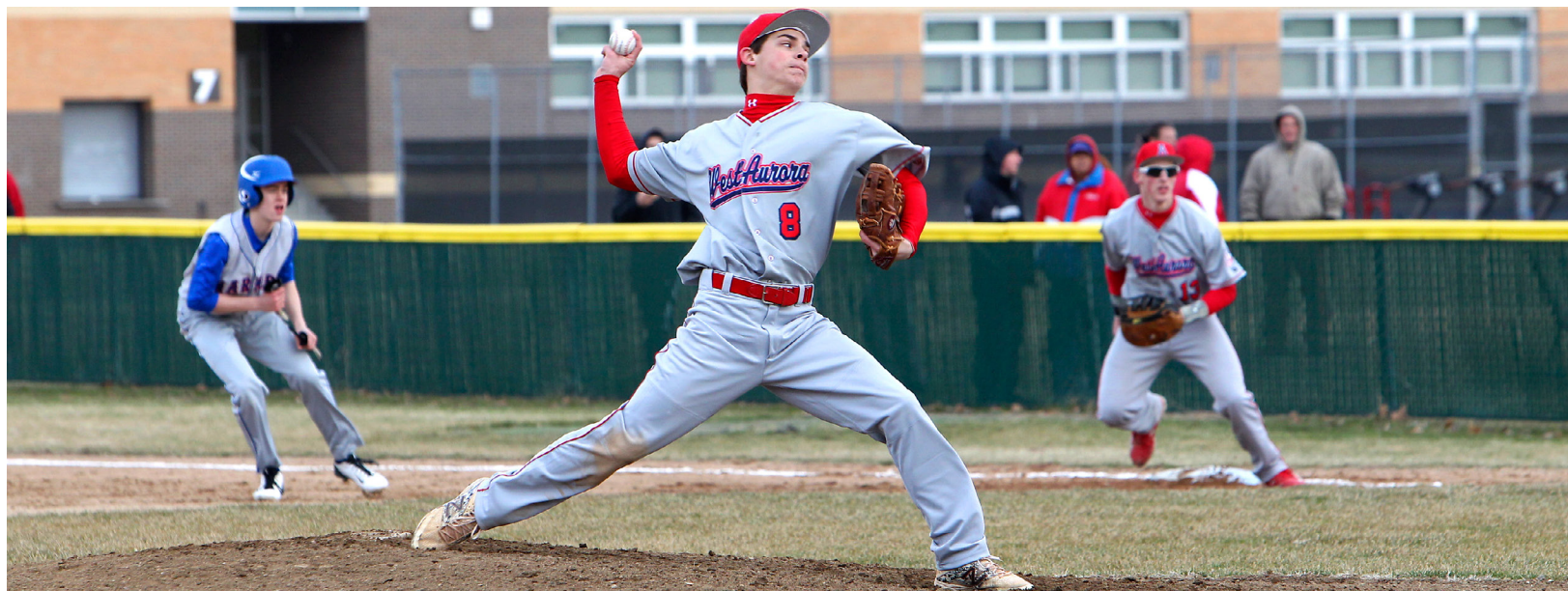

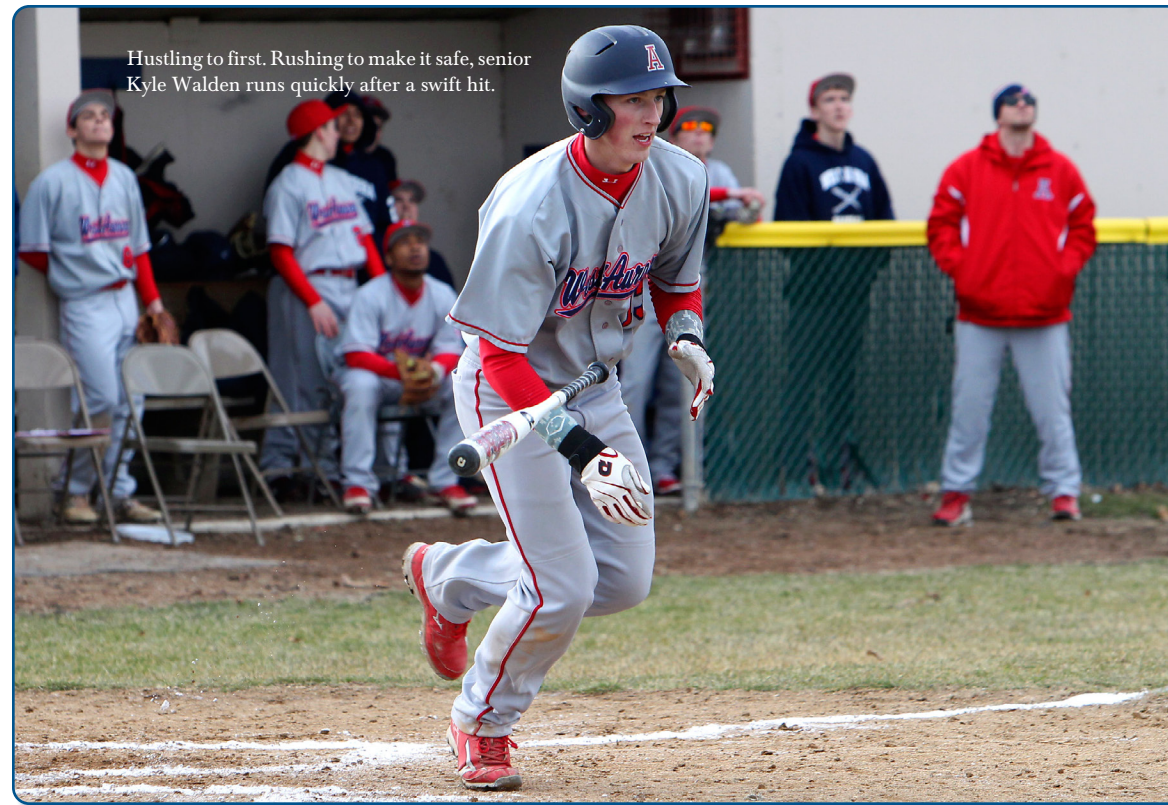

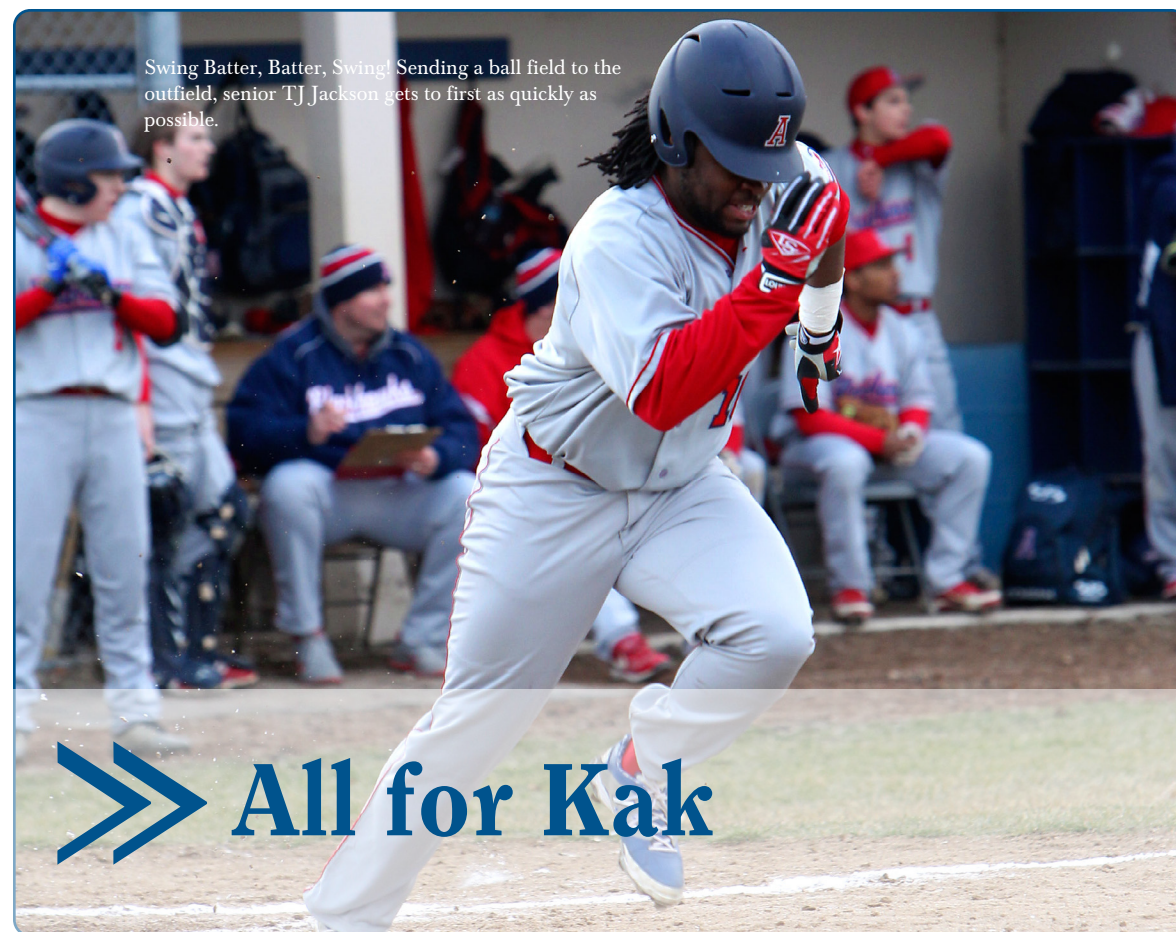

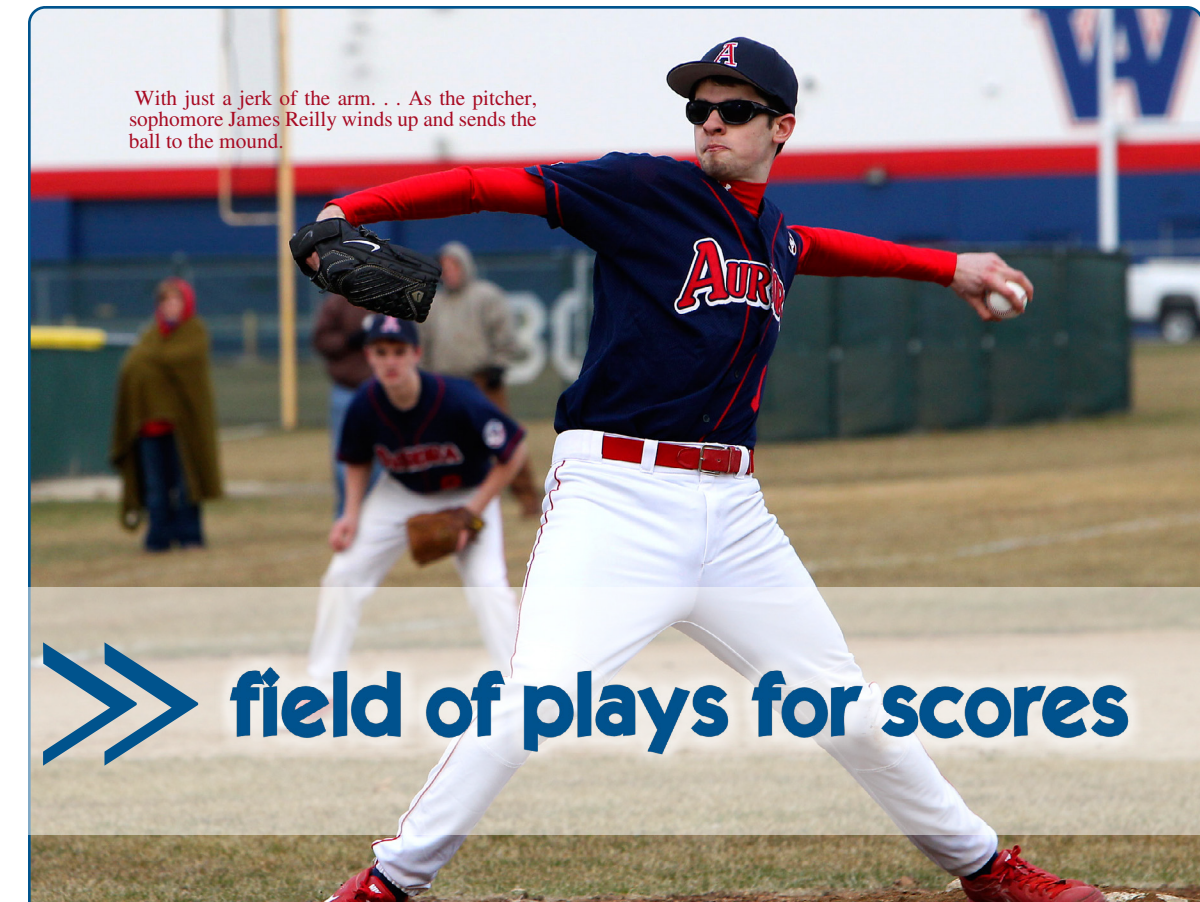

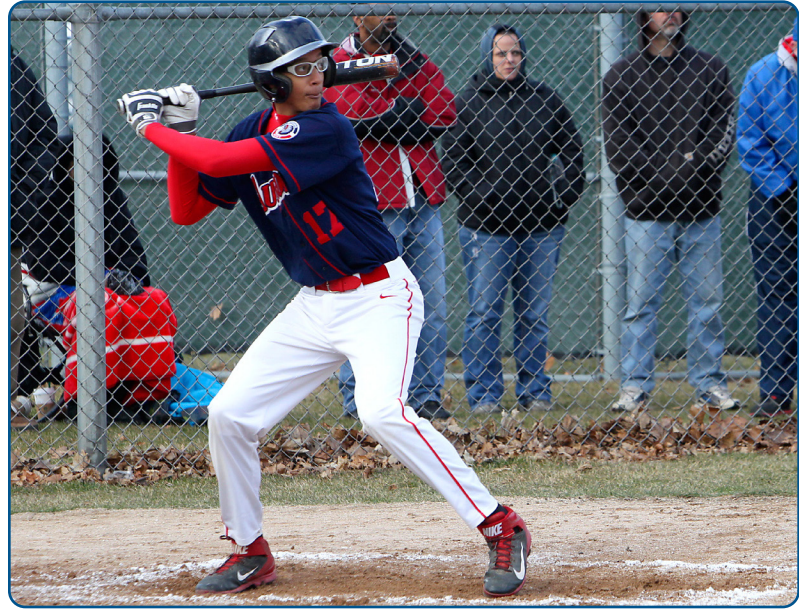

Track can be a challenge sometimes, testing your stamina and endurance.

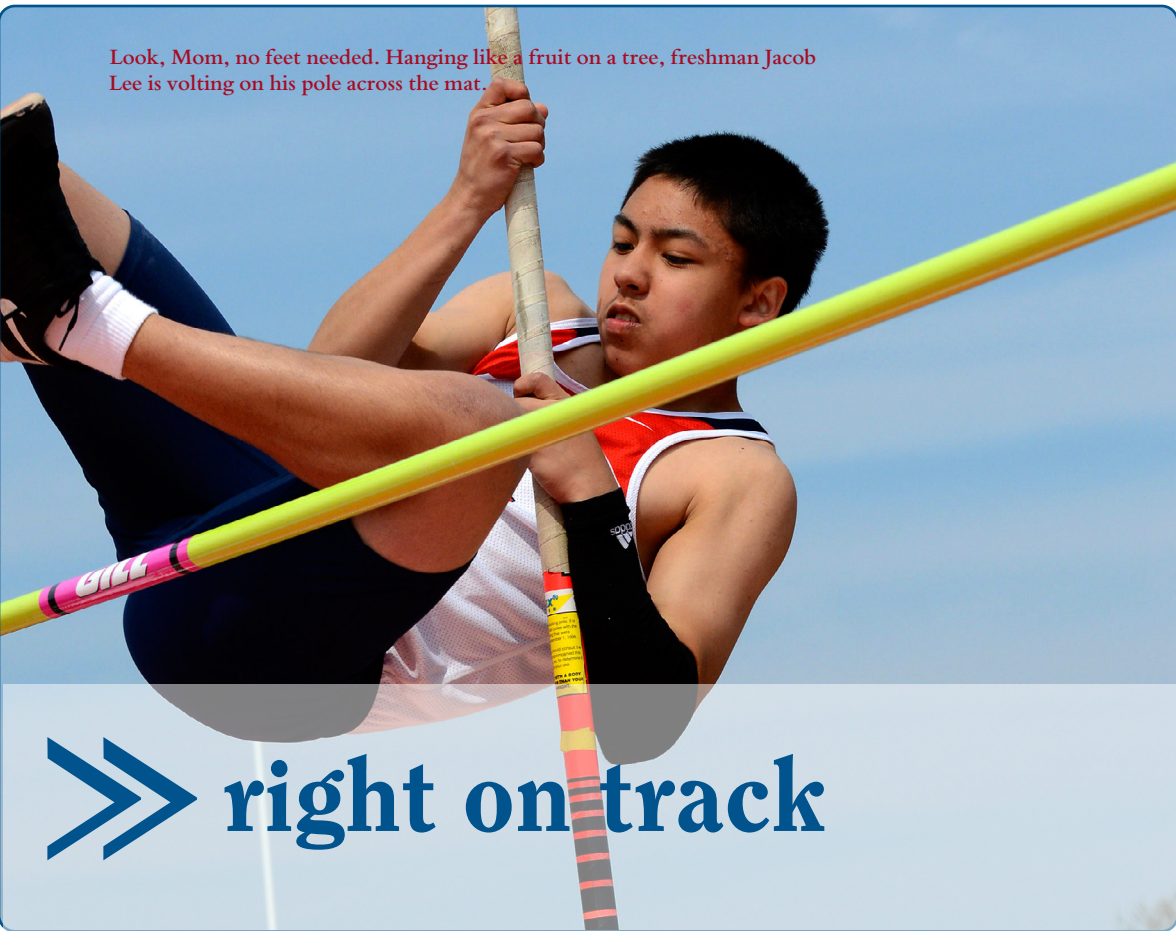
"You have to be precise on your technique to obtain a good score," said sophomore Thomas Yarbrough.

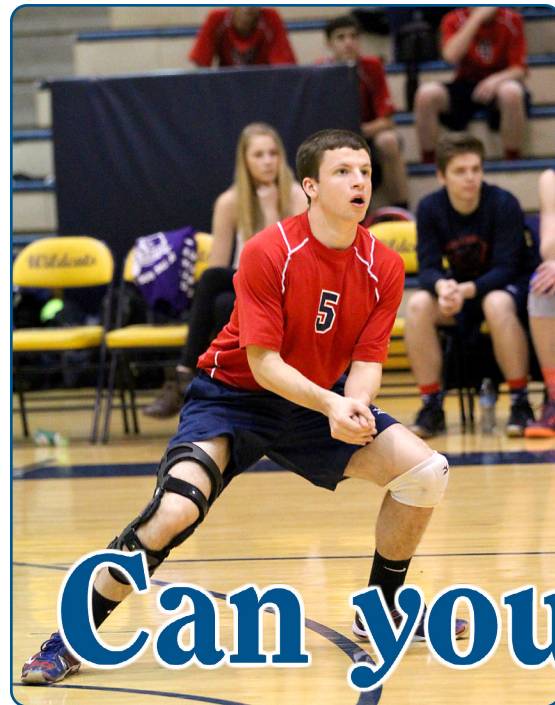

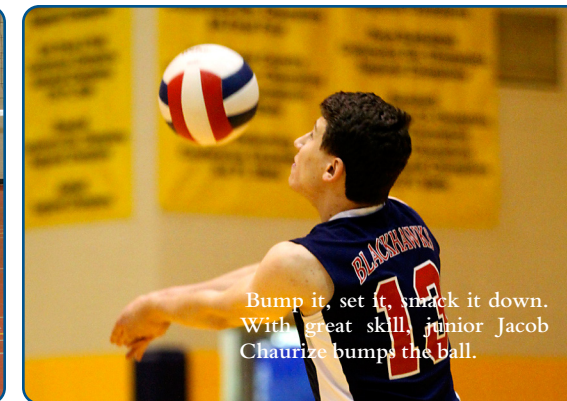

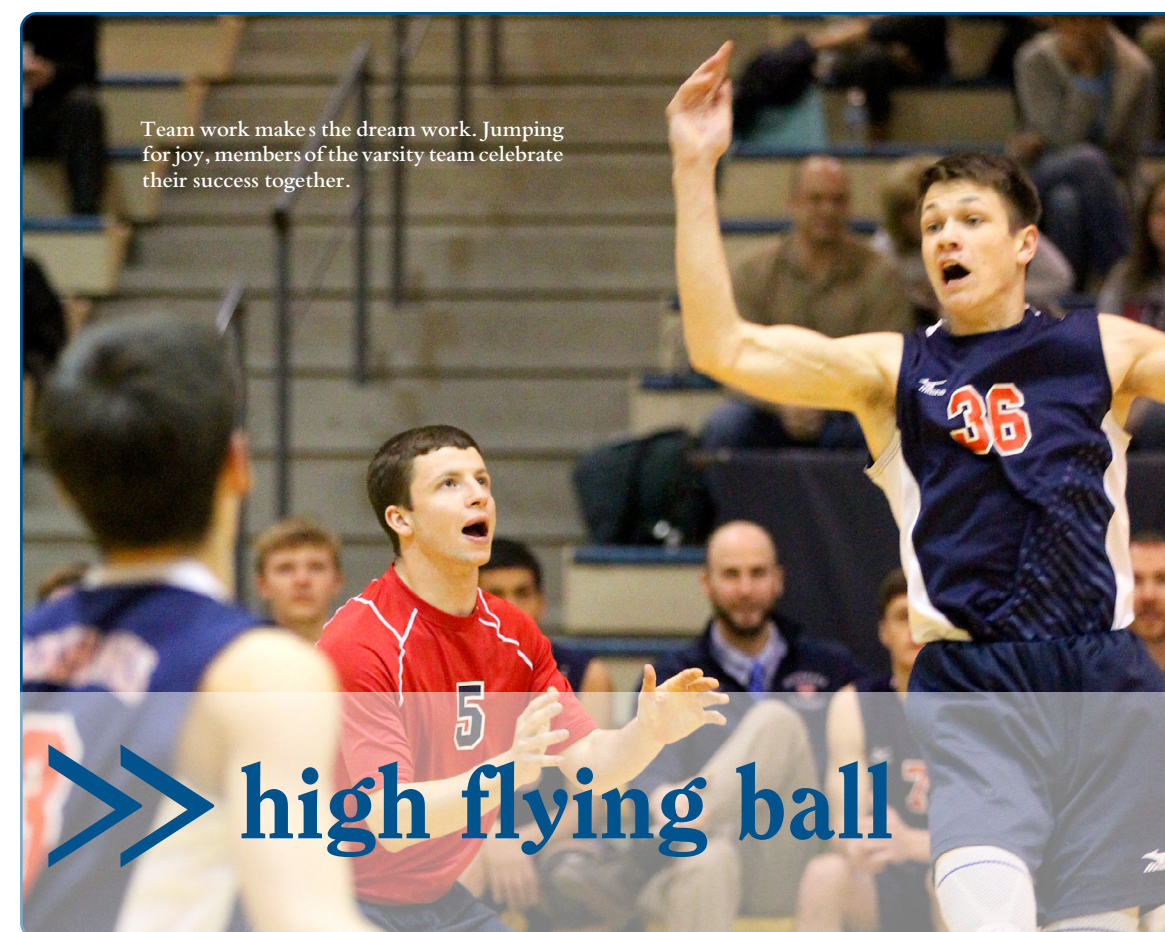

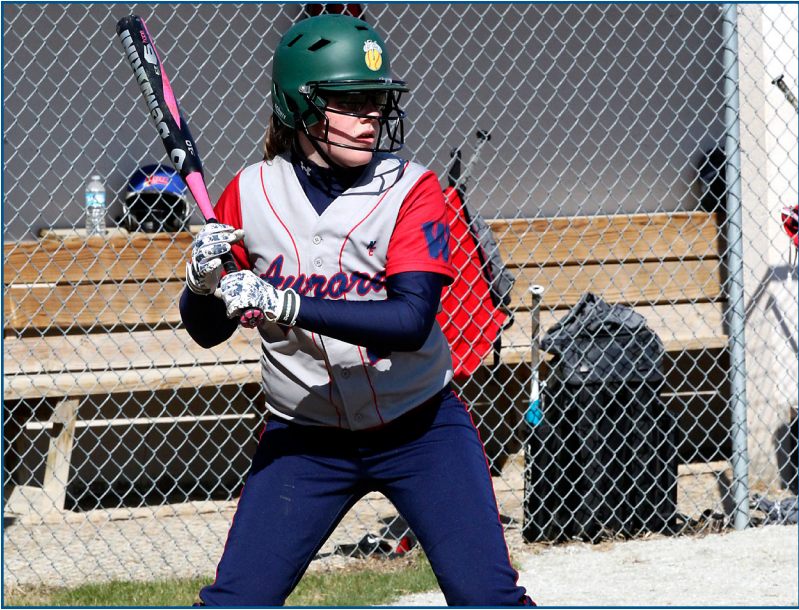

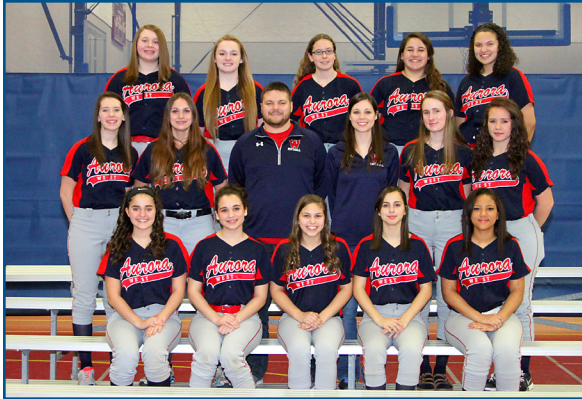
